District 24 Sending Eric Beba to World Championship of Public Speaking Semifinals

Eric Beba is one of 14 speech contestants in the world who will compete for the chance to become the World Champion of Public Speaking later this month in Denver, CO. With his speech, "Live in the Now", Beba reflected on lessons learned from his son and challenged audience members to think more like a child. After advancing through four prior levels of competition, he took highest honors in a regional contest against contestants across eight midwestern states and four central Canadian provinces. The regional win advances Beba to a semifinal round in Denver on August 22 at 10:30am CDT. See **page 10** for details on how you can watch Eric compete.

Beba, whose mission is to change the world one kid at a time, one day at a time, is a life coach, a motivational speaker and a dance instructor. He incorporates elements of all three disciplines in his speeches. While he enjoys his work at a nursing home inspiring and coaching the elderly who have lost their ability to walk or do simple things, it is his love of youth that most engages him. Beba began working with youth in 2009. "If I can get a young person to work at reaching her or his full potential, then I feel I have made a difference in this world," he said. "I impress upon each of them that good communication skills are necessary to improve themselves." Beba teaches dance to both youth and adults at his church.

Beba is a member of <u>Toastmasters Club 281</u>. He joined Toastmasters to improve his communication skills after he moved to the U.S. from Africa in 2004. He uses humor, energy, true-to-life stories, and his own compelling life story to relate to old and young audiences. This will be the second time Beba has made it to the semifinals in Toastmasters International's annual speech contest. He competed in 2014 for the first time.

Pathways Project Pick: Active Listening

Find project in level 2 (required) for Motivational Strategies, Persuasive Influence, and Team Collaboration or level 3 (elective) for all others.

Last month, Jessica asked us to "Connect with Your Audience" to make sure that the audience is listening to us and understanding. This month let's reflect on how we can be better listeners. At my work, we consider various "Levels of Listening." Do you listen only to respond and tell your own story? Are you listening so that you can pass judgement on what a speaker is saying? The highest level of listening is truly listening to understand.

In the Pathways "Active Listening" project you learn the difference between hearing and listening. You also uncover the relationship between listening and strong leadership. Since it is difficult to demonstrate listening while giving a speech, this project has the member demonstrate the ability to listen by fulfilling the role of Table Topicsmaster. You should conduct a well-run Table Topics session and make short, affirming statements after each speaker indicating understanding.

This is more challenging than you might imagine! At my club, the Table Topicsmaster asks the question first and then calls on speakers. When serving in this role, I am often thinking about who doesn't already have a role and who I will call on next. This project challenged me to be more present and engaged with what each speaker is saying.

The best leaders tend to be great listeners. Accept the challenge to increase your confidence and interpersonal strengths by working the "Active Listening" project at your next meeting.

Promote your club with social media

One of the best ways to communicate summaries of your meetings is to use social media. While many community clubs use platforms like Facebook, how can a corporate club leverage the power of social media?

Many companies use a suite of tools from Microsoft called Office 365, that can include a social media application called Yammer. The Mutual of Omaha Toastmasters Club uses Yammer to promote the club. While the club has 41 members, there are currently 87 individuals that are following the updates. By tagging a member's name on an update, it also increases the chance that coworkers may ask them about Toastmasters. How is your club making the most from the power of social media?





Plan Your Journey

Last month I encouraged you to write a one sentence summary of what you seek. This focuses you on what you really want for yourself and /or your club. Knowing where you are going builds confidence and momentum. Feel free to share that one sentence with me.

On a club level, have one person lead the exploration of the Moments of Truth from the Successful Club

Series to focus on where you are. From there, the club can start putting together your **Club Success Plan**, your roadmap to where you are going. In this plan, is your own personal plan.

The best analogy is going on a journey. You pick a destination. You need to know where you are starting. After that, you form your path because you now know where you are going.

It would be nice to do all of the paths at once. This would be unrealistic. This requires you to prioritize and go for the goal that appeals to you the most. A plan makes a goal possible.

History and experience may be a guide, but include a stretch goal too. See if you can achieve that goal in less than one year. Don't aim to impress others about what you hope to do. You are the only one you need to impress and inspire. If you impress and inspire yourself, people will see the results. They will follow your lead if they see it working for you.

Can you complete two paths or two manuals this year? If it is a stretch, acknowledge this and include that you will finish one this year with the stretch goal of two. You are welcome to entertain higher goals and not share them.

It is perfectly fine to under promise and over deliver on those goals you have made known for yourself and your club. Imagine the surprise of your club members as you fly through the material faster than you said you would!

Need someone to get you unstuck? We have **Pathways** and legacy experienced people in this district to help you to speed along! You can do this! Your fellow Toastmasters can help!



Take Me to Your Leader

Did you know your club has an appointed **area director** who can help you grow? This individual serves as a liaison between your club and the broader Toastmasters community. They will visit your club at least twice a year to offer their perspective, answer questions, and share news from our Toastmasters District. If you have not met your area director yet, **expect a visit from them soon**.

How do you prepare for a visit from your area director? If you learn that your area director is coming to visit, be ready to ask them any questions you have about Toastmasters or the District. Recognize that even if the area director does not have answers right away, they can find out more for you. If the area director is contacting you about the visit, find out if they'd like to address the club or fill an open meeting role (if you have one available). Be thankful for the opportunity to hear an outside perspective on your club and to learn and grow with your area director!

Interruptions During Meetings: Rude? Impolite? Acceptable? Necessary? Submitted by District 24 Parliamentarian Karen Watson, DTM

Proper parliamentary procedure calls for debate that allows every member the right to speak. Speaking in everyday conversation no one likes to be interrupted; it is considered rude and impolite. Yet, in meetings, where the purpose is to conduct business, *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* (RONR) *allows* parliamentary steps for motions to interrupt a member who is speaking. Consider two examples where interruption is legitimate, valuable, and even necessary.

- 1. A vote will be taken after this speaker. While giving his summary in debate, noise filters in through the walls making his voice inaudible to members. What can be done?
- 2. Someone is making a motion that you know is contrary to the rules/bylaws of the organization. What can be done?

In both examples, it is very beneficial that parliamentary steps allow for the interruption of the member who is speaking. In the first example, the motion *'raise a question of privilege'* brings the noise situation to the attention of the chair in order to be remedied so members may hear. In the second example, the motion *'point of order'* sustains the objectives of the organization.

For members in an organization, parliamentary knowledge should include knowing when and how to use steps to legitimately interrupt. This is a skill that should not be abused. Interruptions should occur **only when urgency requires it**. Additional motions allowed to interrupt include:

- To Call a Member to Order to call out a member who is not following debate decorum
- To Call for the Orders of the Day to call for a return to the agenda
- To Call for Division of the Assembly to call for a revote on an 'inconclusive' voice vote
- To Call for Separate Vote to call for a single vote on a series of amendments or unrelated resolutions
- A Parliamentary Inquiry to inquire of the correct procedure before action
- A Request for Information to request information

In general, if the presiding chair has granted you permission to speak, you may do so until your debate time is expired. (Even the presiding chair cannot interrupt the person who is speaking so long as the speaker does not violate any of the assembly's rules for speaking and no disorder arises.) But, if you are interrupted, don't be flustered or consider it rude or impolite. Remember that RONR does indeed allow parliamentary steps for legitimate interruptions as a part of debate - even though it seems contrary to common sense and manners. Last, but not least, when you are the member who is interrupting another speaker, be cognizant that urgency is required before doing so because some interruptions during meetings are acceptable, even necessary.
