# The Masks We Wear

In the 1994 movie *The Mask,* Jim Carrey plays Stanley Ipkiss, a down in the dumps bachelor with basically no life. One day, Ipkiss finds an enchanted mask and, after much hesitation, puts it on. Under the influence of the mask, Ipkiss' personality changes radically. Eventually, Ipkiss consults a psychiatrist, played by Ben Stein, who suggests, "We all wear masks, metaphorically speaking."

Over the years, I have worn a number of masks (metaphorically speaking). These include husband, father, grandfather, teacher, coach, etc. More recently, I've gained the masks of Toastmaster, District Officer, and Trio Member. (Yes, there are others.)

The problem with my multitude of masks is both simple and confusing. Simply put, I decide which mask I am going to wear; unfortunately, others have the power to veto my choice and make me change to a different mask. And, worse yet, they don't tell me they made the change!

Have you ever walked into a room and received an unexpected welcome? Most likely, you were wearing the wrong mask. One of the critical tasks facing a speaker is to determine audience and then make sure the presentation fits with the audience's expectation. The audience will judge you by the mask they see you wearing rather than the mask you think you are wearing.

As a Toastmaster I am constantly aware that I may not be seen as I wish to be seen. In addition to that, I may have strong personal opinions about various aspects of Toastmasters. However, I have a dual responsibility here: as a Toastmaster, I have a responsibility to present Toastmasters in a positive light; as a district officer, I must bear in mind that others, realizing I am a district officer, may think that my opinions represent official Toastmasters policy.

Please, speak up for and about Toastmasters, but be aware of who you are with. Don't be misunderstood. Be aware of the mask you are currently wearing and how that influences how people perceive you. Through that awareness, you can ensure that what you say reflects positively on you and on Toastmasters.



# **Membership Campaigns**

I've often heard the question: When is the best time to run a club membership campaign? Toastmasters International sponsors three membership campaigns throughout the year: the Smedley Campaign (August – September), Talk Up Toastmasters (January – February), and Beat the Clock (May – June). These are great opportunities to sponsor membership campaigns to add members to your clubs. There are 6 other months in the year when you can run membership campaigns! Anytime is a good time to run a membership campaign.

What type of campaigns can you run to attract new members? One of the best ones is to have current members invite their friends and family members attend a meeting. Plan a special program where your club showcases the benefits of Toastmaster membership. Be sure to have membership brochures and applications available to distribute to your guests. Try to gather contact information from the guests to follow up with them to see if they've made a decision about joining the club. Invite your Area and Division Directors to attend to help add more diversity to group.

Another way to campaign for new members is for several clubs to join forces and show off the differences between the clubs. Choose a venue where there will be many people in attendance like a local festival or fair.

their leadership! This program was held every other Saturday at Monroe Middle School from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and was completed Saturday, February 16, 2019. The parents were even involved in the final meeting! Pictured to the right, students proudly displayed their certificates of completion along with Toastmasters Jeffrey Williams, George Hast, Floy Westermeier, and Don Hotz.



Another event where students had a chance to work on public speaking and leadership was the 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Urban League of Nebraska Girls' Summer S.T.E.A.M. Academy, which was held at the University of Nebraska of Omaha campus at the Weitz Community Engagement Center from June 3<sup>rd</sup> through July 12th. Twenty middle and high school ladies participated in a 6-week program that focused on STEAM activities as well as leadership. On Monday, July 2, 2019, the focus was on public speaking. The students were given 10 minutes to prepare. After that, each student had 1-2 minutes to discuss up to seven things about themselves (see images of some students below). Each class member was then required to ask at least one question for the presenter to answer. Jeff summarized each presenter's answers to show why taking notes and listening was a respectful part of being a fellow classmate and leader, as well as a way to keep track of what a teacher may talk about during a lesson.

# A Visit to the Toastmasters International Headquarters

A work related trip to Denver, Colorado, provided us with the unique opportunity to tour the Toastmasters International World Headquarters (HQ). Our hotel in the Technology Center area at the border of Centennial and Englewood, in the suburbs of Denver, was only minutes away from the HQ. We reserved a tour ahead of time and were warmly welcomed by our host and tour guide, who was an experienced staff member.

Our tour started with a welcome video by the CEO, who reminded us to thank the hardworking staff, who provide constant service to the members worldwide. Next, we enjoyed an extensive tour of their facilities that primarily included offices and conference rooms occupying the entire 4th and part of the 3rd floor of the building. We saw magnificent mountain views through the huge clear glass windowpanes. The modern office spaces were open with cubicle style areas for the employees.

Interestingly, the many conference rooms were named after countries with Toastmasters presence. A larger conference room was named after a country with a larger footprint. One corridor had conference rooms on each side named after all the Asian countries, and another had names of the European countries, while a third represented South American countries. The design of the offices promoted collaboration between teams.

Some of the teams we met included the educational support team, website and IT support, district and zonal support, financial and audit department, human resources, customer care phone and email support, content writing that did the monthly newsletter, and the program development team. Large clocks, showing time zones around the world, adorned the walls of these big offices. As we walked into each section of the office, laid out as a quadrant, the employees warmly greeted us. It was a Friday, and hence the mood was relaxed and festive. A staff member was celebrating baby shower and had a huge table decorated with cakes and treats for the team. In another quadrant, a birthday celebration was in preparation. We also visited their nice cafeteria and mailroom. The huge space provides opportunity for expansion and growth.

Our tour guide kept us engaged throughout the tour by asking trivia questions on history and facts about Toastmasters such as when and where it was founded, number of worldwide members, number of countries and languages represented, highest number of conference attendees, core values of toastmasters, etc. We got the opportunity to ask questions that ranged from pathways to speech contest rules to future collaborations with Rotary (not a merger). We were relieved to know that the speech contest rules for appointing judges did not change for this year as originally planned due to member feedback.

This tour helped us understand that member feedback is highly valued and enables Toastmasters International to develop their action plans and policies. They are continuously making improvements to the pathways program, based on the feedback. After spending almost 90 minutes in the tour, it ended where we

had begun: in the magnificent lobby and reception area. Behind this area was a museum with historical artifacts such as Ralph Smedley's typewriter with his portrait, an old time keeping device, handwritten notes, old publications, trophies, the golden gavel, and a historical timeline of the Toastmasters evolution. As we thanked our host and tour guide, we were presented with a badge and ribbon that read 'World HQ Visitors' (*as seen in the photo to the right*). We made our way out of the building with fond memories, reflecting on the core values of Toastmasters that was boldly printed on our souvenir HQ bookmarks: Integrity, Respect, Service and Excellence.

# THE SOLUTION TO BORING MINUTES

There are many more interesting things to read than 'minutes' of an organization's meetings, especially if the minutes are longer than a page or two. Yet, the solution to boring minutes is *not* to disregard them. The solution is to know *what to look for* in the minutes. Minutes reveal 'why' you are a member.

Minutes in hand, you should be able to identify the information below in just the first two paragraphs. Good minutes contain (prescribed by Robert's Rules of Order):

Name of Organization

Date of meeting, Kind of meeting, Location of meeting

Name of individual who presided/title {president, grand potentate, district director}

Name of individual who recorded proceedings/title {secretary, administrative personnel}

Indication of Notice having been sent for the meeting

Members present at meeting, i.e. roll call (if needed)

Parliamentary authority and meeting rules under which business was conducted

Approval of previous meeting minutes (endorsement of business before this meeting)

Continue to read the bulk of the minutes which reveal the organization's 'health'. Look for:

- What does the organization do with its monetary resources? Read the Treasurer's Report or Profit Loss Statement. (To investigation how the entire year's resources are distributed, read the annual meeting minutes with adoption of the annual budget.)
- Where does the organization put its human resources? Read the Reports of Committees.
- What are new projects the organization wants to pursue? Read the New Business.
- Do the members have integrity and want to follow their bylaws? Look for Points of Order.
- Is the membership willing to listen to input from all members? Look for appeals.

You are hereby challenged. TAKE THIS TEST. **Before attending the next meeting**, read the most currentdated minutes of your organization. Find the answers to the questions above. Knowing this information, one of two things will result. Either you will find yourself bored and indifferent OR you will discover information you realize is valuable and useful on which to base decisions going forward as a voting member of the organization.

Why does an organization have 'minutes'? To know what they've done in the past. Who cares about what has been done in the past? It projects the future. Minutes of an organization can confirm to you that:

- The objectives of the organization are given priority or not.
- The leadership is guiding the organization to accomplish its vision and mission or not.
- Your participation as a member is needed and valued or not.
- You should continue as a member or not.

Based on the information in minutes, you'll know whether or not the organization is worth more than just your time spent reading the minutes! The Solution to Boring Minutes? Don't spend your time reading minutes unless it's to find answers. Read the minutes so they reveal and give insight into 'why' you remain a member - regardless if you like reading minutes or not. Keep the lists above to know what to look for.

The massive amount of 'no' statements we expect may instead be more 'yes' statements than we ever thought possible. It is all on what you say and how you say it, skills we practice in our Toastmasters presentations.

On YouTube, the 'Yes' Theory videos show young adult men doing crazy stunt-like activities that stretch them way beyond their comfort zone. I would not recommend 99% of those actions, by the way. Other safer and more doable Toastmasters related actions are well within most of our own personal reaches. Giving a presentation is far safer than sleeping above a canyon on a hammock at night, for example.

Taking secure risks in Toastmasters does tend to encourage me to take other risks. Zip lining myself from a mountain in Alaska to the port at over 60 miles per hour was one of mine a few years ago. It provides great material for future presentations!

Present an educational session to your club, area, division, or to the district. This would take you outside of your comfort zone, encourage you to learn a skill well enough to train others in how to do it, and make a difference in the lives of other people.

Teach people how to read. Adults that had some learning disability or circumstance which prevented them from learning how to read well. Children that are struggling in school, including in how to read. Not only does this make a difference in the lives of others, the overall experience shared in a Toastmasters club presentation would be reliving golden moments.

Do something that you never would have done otherwise. By taking you out of your comfort zone, you may just energize your life. By seeking slight discomfort, you grow the most. If you aced everything always, what is there to learn? Seek that which makes you feel uncomfortable. Toastmasters was initially this for many people. How will you expand on that thought to broaden your future Toastmasters experience? How will you live the 'dash'?
