Change is hard and can be painful and embarrassing. Mistakes can be huge. If we never attempted these, we would never have learned from each of those experiences. Sometimes we are inspired by others and the growth they have made. This spurs us to give it a try.

The Personal Touch

I work for a company that prides itself on peer recognition. In our case, employees can give a Spot Award to a peer. The spot award comes with some money attached. (A gift card and yes, we pay taxes on the value of the card.) Over the years I have both given and received Spot Awards. In some cases, I have received Spot Award and found myself wondering “What did I do to deserve this?”

As originally implemented, each employee had a quota of Spot Awards they could give and, this was a key point, approval was automatic! Unfortunately, as the program evolved, approval of the award became more difficult and employee participation has declined.

Do you know that Toastmasters can give out “Spot Awards” as well? We don’t call them Spot Awards, of course. In Pathways, we call them “badges”. Everyone, at least those who are “Pathways enrolled”, can present a badge to another member of your home club. Like everything else in Pathways, the process for awarding a badge is rather simple: a few clicks and the badge is on its way!

I don’t know how many Toastmasters have either given or received badges. I have. As with much of Pathways, however, I actually found the badge quite accidentally. (Several months after it was awarded. I

really need to become more engaged in the Pathways experience.)

Toastmasters is an organization made of individuals dedicated to two ideas: self-improvement and mutual support. We all take pride in stating “Toastmasters is a safe place to fail.” We solemnly swear that our club provides “supportive and positive learning experiences” and help members achieve “greater self-confidence and personal growth.” We show our support via peer feedback and applause. You do that all the time, don’t you? If not, why not?

Peer feedback and applause, especially in an intimate club setting, are very personal ways of supporting our fellow Toastmasters. What else can we do?

Earlier this year, PID Pat Hannan shared with the District Executive Council her thoughts on giving feedback and encouragement as a part of your

Toastmasters experience. Pat called this “Personal Touch.” Her idea: do something personal to thank and/or encourage another member. Write them a note; give them a call. But,

MAKE IT PERSONAL!

This is my challenge to you as our Toastmasters year draws to an end: write and send two notes. Thank a fellow Toastmaster for helping you. After that, encourage a fellow

Toastmaster and help them on their path to “greater self-confidence and personal growth.”

Let's Try Something New!

In a recent See Us Speak club meeting, we discussed different meeting themes. One member suggested doing something called "Who's Slide Is It Anyways?". He explained this works like Table Topics. Simply gather a group of funny but tasteful pictures and give a club member about 30 seconds to look at a picture and then make up a story about what happened to cause the situation.

Recently, See Us Speak tried this theme and it was just hilarious. Toastmaster Michael Dalke gathered about a dozen crazy pictures and took a few minutes to explain about Improv. The guidelines for Who's Slide were as follows:

- A Toastmaster is chosen at random from the audience.
- The chosen Toastmaster can describe the picture by themselves or choosing a partner to describe the picture.
- The picture is then revealed and about 30 seconds is given to look at the picture.
- Once a Toastmaster starts to speak, they receive a maximum of 3 minutes to describe the picture.

Everyone took a turn to describe a picture. Here's a sample of one of the pictures.

Some Toastmasters had so much fun they took two turns describing a picture!

Here are some variations of Who's Slide to try. Develop a three to five picture slide presentation and have a Toastmaster present a 5 – 7-minute ad-hoc speech describing the slides. Another variation is to

show the picture and give a Toastmaster 1 to 2 minutes to begin a story. At the end of the time, the story is handed off to another Toastmaster to continue for 1 to 2 minutes. Continue handing off to different Toastmasters until the story reaches a natural end. You can also set a maximum number of storytellers for each picture.

Give Who's Slide a try if you are looking for a different meeting theme. If you do try Who's Slide, send me an email and let me know it worked! My email address is cindy.jenkins18020@gmail.com.

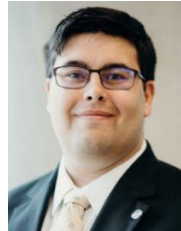

Do You Qualify? Are You Motivated? Are You Willing?

WHO? YOU. **WHAT?** Invest in a Life Skill. **WHEN?** During the TM year 2019-2020. **WHERE?** In District 24.

WHY?

Incoming District Director Linda Wilson is inviting members of District 24 to learn about the role of serving as a parliamentarian. Linda believes this educational opportunity will result in an abundance of future 'member parliamentarians' ready to serve District 24 - as well as the communities in which we live.

DO YOU QUALIFY TO LEARN TO BE A PARLIAMENTARIAN?

- Have you been in a slow, disorganized meeting resulting in inconclusive or no decisions being made?
- Are you in opposition to injustice, oppression, and dictatorships?
- Do you belong to any kind of {local, state, national, or international} voluntary organization?
- Are you {petrified, fearful, or nervous} to use your voice to speak in front of a group?

Answering YES to at least 3 or these 4 questions makes you a **prime prospect** to be a parliamentarian! *

WHAT COULD MOTIVATE YOU?

The lofty role of a parliamentarian is akin to a calling. A parliamentarian is a person who desires to help intelligent people "get along." A parliamentarian assists organizations to use the procedures of their organization's parliamentary authority {AIPSC, Demeter's, Cannon's, Cushing's, or Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised} to make, after fair debate, rational decisions of consequence with efficiency; regardless of differing levels of passion on opposing sides; regardless of the complexity of the issues; regardless of the number of questions to be decided; regardless of the amount of available time.

ARE YOU WILLING?

When anyone invests in the life skill to be trained as a parliamentarian, they are taking a progressive step to promote and embrace fairness which ultimately contributes to world peace. But, "one does not become a parliamentarian merely by listening to lectures and reading instructions. There must be an opportunity for practice." (The Great Peacemaker, Ralph C. Smedley Borden Publishing Company, Los Angeles, p. 52)

HOW CAN YOU PRACTICE TO BE A PARLIAMENTARIAN?

1. By yourself, read and study all 716 pages of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised.

---OR---

2. Take an opportunity to have fun! Learn and practice with other Toastmasters!

Immediate Past International President Balraj Arunasalam promotes TM as a 'Learning Laboratory' where we learn personal and professional skills together. Then, we take these skills and put them to good use. "Make an impact in your world with what you learn in Toastmasters." (TOASTMASTER magazine, December 2017, page 2) The skill of knowing the parliamentary procedure is "transferable." You need to learn it ONLY ONCE, then, it can be transferred to numerous other organizations in which you are involved, such as your homeowners association, local school PTA/PTOs, hobby clubs, political parties, churches, civic clubs, unions, lodges, league of voters, or business or professional organizations.
